Fishing in British Columbia by Bob Halgren

Last September my brother took me fishing in British Columbia to the Langara Fishing Lodge. It is located on an island in the north Queen Charlotte Sound, just west of Prince Rupert and south of Ketchikan. It was the trip of a lifetime.

My brother has done this trip for the last twenty years or so, always renting a skiff and being his own guide. This time he rented a beautiful 24-foot boat, complete with a guide who drove the boat, got our poles ready to go, and netted the fish. The best part was the boat was named after my old beagle, a rascal named Cruiser.

We flew into Vancouver, toured the city, and then flew to Masset on a commuter jet. From there I got to ride in the front seat of a helicopter which transported us on the last leg of the trip. What a view!

The fishing lodge is comprised of two barges with rustic cabins, a first-class restaurant, a bar, a nurses office, a gift store, a bakery, a fish processing plant, and associated docks and a helo pad.

We would get up early so we could be on the water at first light, sometimes come in for lunch, and return at dusk. We fished at different places around the island depending on what fish we were going for: salmon, ling cod, or halibut. All hooks were non-barbed, so we could throw back undersized fish. The most fun we had was fishing the salmon. We trolled with 4 poles in the water. It was a little tricky landing the fish as I wasn't used to the reel type (the drag did not function if you had your hand on the reel knob), but once I got the hang of it, it went ok. We got our limits on halibut and ling cod and did ok on the salmon.

After five days of fishing I was tired but jacked up. What fun and incredible beauty. It had been many years since I had fished this much

and to get such high-quality fish was a real treat. But the best part of the trip was to reconnect with my brother, telling stories of our childhood and current tales. Although we see each during the year in mainly group settings, nothing beats one on one time.
